WHY DOES THE PASTOR WEAR A ROBE?



FIRST AND FOREMOST, the wearing of clerical robes is scriptural. The practice derives from the Old Testament, where the ministerial office was set apart with a robe. In fact, an entire chapter of Scripture, Exodus 28, is devoted to clerical garments. At the very least, we can extrapolate from all these passages that it is very appropriate for those leading God's people in worship to be set apart with a robe. Moving into the New Covenant era, Christian ministers adopted the practice of wearing specific vestments while leading worship as early as the second century AD. They adopted this biblical practice because, among other things, wearing clerical garments helps emphasize the pastor's office and de-emphasize the man in the pulpit. That idea is still applicable today. Just as policemen, doctors, auto mechanics, and military service members wear unique clothing that applies to their calling, so should the pastor, especially when performing the specific duties of his office during the Lord's Day worship service. And this includes donning more than just a suit and tie because the pastor is not a businessman. He is not the CEO of the ecclesiastical corporation. When the minister of Word and Sacrament wears a robe, it helps to focus the congregation on the work of Christ and the building of His Kingdom because that is the field that ministers operate within. The reformed theologian Richard Paquier wrote of this idea: "It is natural that the man who officiates in the worship of the Church be clothed in a manner corresponding to the task assigned to him. Moreover, whoever leads in the act of worship does not perform as a private party but as a minister of the Church; he is the representative of the community - hence, an especially prescribed robe, a sort of ecclesiastical "uniform," is useful for reminding both the people and the pastor himself that, in the act of leading worship, he is not Mr. So-and-so, but a minister of the Church amid a multitude of others whom he is to serve."

From the time of the Reformation, Protestant pastors continued the practice of pastoral robes but intentionally differentiated them from those of Roman Catholic priests. By the Middle Ages, Roman Catholic priests had begun wearing very elaborate and overly ornate robes. This promoted the notion of the priest being above the congregation rather than merely set apart as an officer of Word and Sacrament. Because of this, the Protestant Reformation of the sixteenth century sought to correct this unbiblical view of the priesthood. They argued from Scripture in their preaching, teaching, and writing that the pastor is a divinely appointed servant of the Church, not an exalted individual with a greater spiritual status than the people. But the Protestant Reformers did not throw the baby out with the bathwater either. They would never have considered it acceptable for a minister to wear street clothes or business attire while conducting the worship service. To that end, the Reformers sought to do away with excessively lavish vestments and simply wore plain preaching robes, later known as 'Geneva gowns' (named after the Swiss city of Geneva, where John Calvin served as one of the pioneering leaders of the Reformation.) This idea also included the continued use of the Pastoral Stole that ministers wear over their robes. The stole was originally the work-cloth slaves wore around their necks and used to wash and dry their master's feet. It is also symbolic of the yoke of Christ that pastors take on at their ordination, thus marking pastors as slaves of Christ and servants to their congregation.

Additionally, the robe adds dignity and reverence to our services. Many modern people mistakenly think avoiding all formality and ceremony is evidence of a simple faith and humility. By contrast, C. S. Lewis said, "The modern habit of doing ceremonial things unceremoniously is no proof of humility; rather, it proves the worshiper's inability to forget himself in the service, and his readiness to ruin the proper place of ritual." Wearing a pulpit robe compliments a reverent atmosphere and helps set the tone of the service. I intentionally and purposefully wear a robe for worship to communicate to the congregation - and to remind myself - that when I bring the Word or preside at the Lord's Table, I am fulfilling a sacred office, one that calls all of us away from the mundane things of this world and into the Holy Spirit inspired worship of the Almighty.




