QUESTION 35 What is sanctification?

ANSWER: Sanctification is the work of God's free grace by which we are renewed in our whole person in the image of God and by which we are enabled more and more to die to sin and live to righteousness.

QUESTION 36

What are the benefits that accompany justification, adoption and sanctification in this life?

ANSWER:

The benefits that accompany justification, adoption and sanctification in this life are the assurance of God's love, peace of conscience, joy in the Holy Ghost, increase of grace, and perseverance in it to the end.

Disease, Depression, Plague and Panic

In the summer of 1527, plague struck Wittenberg, Germany. Martin Luther's family was among its first victims. Sickness and death spread the city with such speed that Prince John of Saxony closed the university in Wittenberg and ordered the Reformer and his family to leave the city. Luther refused, insisting on the church's responsibility to proclaim the Gospel and to care for the sick and dying. Even more threatening though, was the melancholy that assaulted Luther. Spiritual depression and anxiety were familiar nemeses: Luther's earliest battles with doubt and temptation in the monastery had nearly driven him mad. His discovery of justification by faith alone saved his life. Luther's depression was always marked by the same features: a feeling of profound aloneness, a sense that God was singling him out for suffering, a loss of faith that God was good and good to him, and a resulting inward self-reliance. Luther's depression only intensified under the unforeseen burden of the religious, political and cultural difficulties of his day. Eventually sickness, external stress, and internal anxiety conspired and drove him to the brink of despair. In a letter to his friend Philip Melanchthon on August 2, 1527, Luther wrote: I spent more than a week in death and hell. My entire body was in pain, and I still tremble. Feeling completely abandoned by Christ, I labored under the vacillations and storms of desperation and blasphemy against God. But through the prayers of dear friends, God began to have mercy on me and pulled my soul from the inferno below.

While an understanding of mental health at the time didn't allow for a professional psychiatrist or psychologist to diagnose Luther with depression or any other disorder, the signals are all there. Knowing is a great comfort to us and a real encouragement during those "dark nights of the soul" Luthers story is an inspiration to everyone who has ever battled with depression and doubt, because it means that these temporary detours are not insurmountable obstacles or spiritual death sentences. They don't have to hold us back. Our plateaus and setbacks are a natural and normal part of our path to sanctification and do not erase the progress we've already made.

Through the daily study of scripture and times of prayer, Luther eventually understood the source of his despair. He recognized in it not only the elements of spiritual warfare, but his overreliance on his own personal feelings and emotions. And, his response is instructive, because he not only deciphered the causes of his depression in the supernatural realm, but the emotional defects within himself. While he recognized emotions were useful agents for reflection, repentance, and resolve, he also acknowledged they were sometimes prompted overly inflated responses to life's circumstances. When it comes to considering the difficulties of our world "The Devil," he remarked, was "in the habit of turning an insect into a camel." These ideas mirror the teaching of the Apostle Peter in his First Epistle where he wrote:

Both Paul and Luther's advice were that we should willingly endure the hand of God in all of our difficulties. Their exhortations, however, weren't to simply endure, but to thank God in all of our difficulties. "Do not be worried," Luther insisted. "Indeed, such trials are the very best sign of God's grace and love for man." "So do not despair, but at such a time as this it is well for us to pray, to read, and to sing to the Lord." That is why public worship is essential now more than ever.
